Our Advent Family Lessons are offered as a way to fulfill some aspects of our overall curriculum in a way that is convenient and enjoyable for our families. We instituted this as a way to both honor family life and help families discover or rekindle Catholic traditions while learning more about the faith together. This is a special aspect of the Religious Education program, designed to honor family life as the "Domestic Church."

- Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy (Feed the hungry, comfort the sorrowful):
 - Work on a service project as a family Unforgotten Haven is a great local organization that offers many opportunities to help others. <u>Click here</u> for a list of their projects with details.
 - Bake a special treat or a cook a meal for someone else a person or family in need, whether the need is spiritual (loneliness, sadness) or physical (hunger, thirst). Or you may choose to adopt a family through an organization and provide a Christmas meal for them. However you choose to carry this out, have your family include the person/people you are serving in your prayers throughout the season (or longer). Online resource for baking/cooking:

- Tradition of the Jesse Tree: Advent is a season of waiting, and a Jesse Tree is a great way to prepare for Jesus by journeying through the stories on Jesus's family tree. For each day of Advent, read a Bible story about someone on Jesus's family tree and hang an ornament symbolizing the story on your Jesse Tree. As you decorate your tree, you'll see how God prepared for Jesus to be born through many generations. For ideas, templates, and Bible readings, there are two great links which provide instructions and free printables: Simply Catholic or Faithmag.
- Preparing our Hearts for Baby Jesus (for younger children or for a younger child and an older sibling):
 This activity focuses on getting ourselves ready for the birth of Jesus by doing good for others. Children make a simple craft of Jesus in the manger and each time a family member observes him/her doing something kind, a piece of hay is added to the manger. This craft can be very simple mangers can be made from paper bags with the top cut off, hay can be pieces of yarn or paper. ** You can find instructions at this link.** The manger should be something children can either make themselves or can help with; the purpose

is really to encourage and teach little ones that showing kindness towards others is one of the best ways we can get ready for Christmas.

*An older sibling can choose to do this activity if he or she commits to being the "observer" who adds hay to the manger when noticing the younger child's good deeds.

Advent with the Saints: <u>St. Nicholas Day – December 6th</u> and <u>Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe –</u> December 12th

- Advent Angels Each week, place family member names in a hat and pick out a name. The goal is for each person to perform acts of kindness and service (in secret) for the person whom they've picked. You can switch the names from week to week to spread joy and creativity, or continue with the same person for the all the weeks of Advent.
- International Traditions: Many countries around the world have unique and beautiful traditions for Advent or Christmas. Learn about and include one of these traditions with your family. Here are a few examples:
